






Lake Sonoma Storage

Impacts:

• Travel will be difficult to impossible on high mountain passes.

Timing:

Heavy snow will begin to fall for elevations above 2500 feet across Northern Trinity County between 2 and 6 PM Friday. Periods of heavy snow above 2500 feet will continue through Saturday evening.
A period of accumulating snow is expected across Southern Trinity County for elevations above 3000 feet between 2 PM Friday to 2 AM Saturday.

• Northern Trinity County: Storm total snowfall from 5 to 22 inches for elevations above 2500 feet.

• Southern Trinity County: Storm total snowfall during Friday night up to 7 inches for elevations above 3000 feet.

≓≎ Strong Wind	 Impacts: Power disruptions probable. Risk of falling trees/limbs will be high. Loose objects will be blown around. High profile vehicles will be difficult to control. Timing: Strongest winds expected from 4 PM Friday to 2 AM Saturday.
	 Gusts from 50 to 70 mph likely across exposed ridges and coastal areas. Strong east-southeast winds also possible through gaps in terrainsuch as river valleys/outlets to the ocean. Storm force marine winds across adjacent coastal waters from 1 PM Friday to 1 AM Saturday.


<equation-block> Heavy Rain</equation-block>	 Impacts: Localized urban/small stream flooding possible. Rises on creeks, streams, and rivers likely. River flooding not expected. Increased risk of mountain rock/mud slides. Marginal risk of debris flows across burn scars. Timing: Heavy rain will spread across the low lands Friday evening. Rainfall rates will peak during Friday night. Heavy rain will exit the region during late Saturday morning.
	 Storm total rainfall amounts ranging from 2.5 to 3.5 inches throughout the area. Locally higher amounts of 4 to 6 inches along southwest oriented coastal ridges.







\$34,500 in ACWA Scholarships Available in 2023

As a member of the Association of California Water Agencies, the Mendocino County Russian River Flood Control & Water Conservation Improvement District is proud to share several ACWA scholarship opportunities for high-achieving graduate or undergraduate students majoring in a water resources-related field.

- The Stephen K. Hall ACWA Water Law & Policy Scholarship (\$10,000) is awarded annually to <u>one</u> graduate student majoring in law, policy or public administration with a focus or concentration in California water resources.
- The Arthur L. Littleworth Best Best & Krieger Diversity Scholarship (\$10,000 distributed evenly over four years) is awarded annually to <u>one</u> undergraduate student pursuing a degree related to law, water law, water policy or public administration. High school seniors and undergraduate freshman are eligible to apply.
- **The Clair Hill Scholarship (\$5,000)** is awarded to <u>one</u> student majoring in engineering, agricultural and/or urban water supply, environmental studies, public administration and other water-resources related fields.
- ACWA Scholarships (\$3,500) are awarded to <u>two</u> undergraduate students majoring in engineering, agricultural and/or urban water supply, environmental studies, public administration and other water-resources related fields.
- **The Edward G. "Jerry" Gladbach Scholarship (\$2,500)** is awarded to <u>one</u> undergraduate student majoring in engineering, agricultural and/or urban water supply, environmental studies, public administration and other water-resource related fields.
