Water Supply Availability in the Russian River Watershed in 2022

Update issued by the State Water Board on 12/2/22:

Due to additional precipitation in the region, the Division of Water Rights has posted an updated Curtailment Status List on the <u>Russian River Drought Response webpage</u> that takes effect on December 3, 2022. This update is anticipated to be in effect through December 31, 2022. **Curtailments are lifted for all appropriative water rights in the watershed.** Riparian claimants diverting under a Statement of Diversion and Use are not subject to correlative reductions. Right holders must continue to monitor the Curtailment Status List for the latest curtailment statuses. Division staff will continue to actively monitor forecasted precipitation within the watershed for the rest of December and will post a revised Curtailment Status List should supply conditions change.



NEW REPORT SHOWS CONTINUED WATER CONSERVATION IS KEY, 11/28/22

Broadly, the assessments show the importance of conservation by individual Californians to help suppliers meet demands through June 30, 2023. In this year's assessments, urban water suppliers indicate that they will rely on either continued conservation or more aggressive actions to meet demand through June 30, 2023, if dry conditions persist. They report that they can ensure adequate water supplies through water-saving strategies, such as requiring customers to limit outdoor water and providing leak detection and repair services.

New Executive Officer for North Coast Regional Water Board

A warm welcome to Valerie Quinto, the new executive officer appointed to oversee daily operations and serve as the principal advisor on water quality regulation and policy. "Having Ms. Quinto stepping into this role assures that the agency will continue to provide leadership and stewardship of the North Coast's precious waters," said Greg Giusti, the regional board's chair. "Outgoing Executive Officer Matt St. John created a balanced approach to protecting water quality while building strong working relationships with groups and individuals throughout the region, and I see that continuing."



"The agency has a great team and staff, and a board that has coalesced around a strong vision," said Quinto, who was born and raised in Sonoma County. "My strongest personal conviction is that water quality is not negotiable, and I am eager to work with my new colleagues and the North Coast's diverse, regulated community to build on the board's accomplishments protecting the region's waters."

St. John says his decision to step away from the board's top executive position and into the newly created role of climate specialist is inspired by the many climate-related challenges the North Coast is facing, from prolonged drought to the threat of sea level rise. This new position was created to help advance regulatory and non-regulatory actions with the board's partners to help address these challenges.







Lake Sonoma Storage




Lake Pillsbury Storage and Target Storage Scenarios






